- The NCAS Volunteer Program currently has over 100 volunteers helping to socialize dogs and cats.
- In 2006, the NCAS had a euthanasia rate of 2% due to our activities.

WANTED: A Few Good Fosters!!!

In an issue of our newsletter filled with coverage of recent high visibility fund raisers, I'd like to focus my comments this issue on an equally important topic that's rather behind the scenes and unnoticed: Fostering animals.

When the pups and kittens are too small to be altered and need a place to stay and when animals are sick and need a quiet place to recover, this is when fosters are called to act. Fosters are volunteers who are willing to take an animal(s) into their homes to love and treat as one of their own for a short period of time.

While it's easy to see the benefits the cats and dogs receive from fostering, there are also many positives for humans as well. New owners of fostered animals get a much more socialized animal addition. Children of NCAS volunteers who foster learn the responsibility of caring for animals, and the importance of spaying and neuter-

ing. Volunteers themselves learn, yet again, how to give of themselves to a creature that is less fortunate.

Of course, it's not all positive and sometimes it's down right difficult. Each animal has its own personality, and

and end up keeping the animals. Ours is a kitten fostering household and we fall into this category. In many of the litters we foster, it seems that there is one kitten who just ends up staying with us. This fact is born out in that in the 18 months we've been fostering, we've gone from a 2 cat household to a 6 cat home. We weren't looking for these additions, they instead seemingly found us, and consequently are all the more meaningful to us.

It's a Dog's Life (and a Cat's Too!) by Dr. Rob Avery

Obesity is one of the most common problems identified in our pets. Diabetes, arthritis, poor skin, trouble breathing, cardiovascular disease and surgical complications are all increased risks with obesity. In particular, cats are susceptible to hepatic lipidosis, a condition that can be fatal.

As with people, excessive weight gain in pets occurs by eating too much and not exercising enough! Aging and medical conditions can further reduce a pet's ability to exercise. Often weight gain occurs by owners until it is quite severe.

The simply stated but hard to accomplish solution to obesity is to feed our pets less. Fewer calories going in will result in less fat accumulation. Always start by measuring the food accurately and figure out how much you are actually feeding each meal. Calculate all other sources of food; include treats, table food and food stolen from other dogs, cats or neighbors. Next, reduce the total by about 25 %. This means that if you are feeding about 4 cups of food each day, cut back to 3 cups. A change to a low calorie diet food may help your pet to feel full. The addition of vegetables- green beans, carrots or zucchini can also be helpful. Instead of refilling the bowl when your pet acts hungry, just add a few kibbles to appease their hunger. You could try distracting your pet by going for a walk or playing with them for a few minutes.

If you have multiple pets, this program can be difficult. Pets

steal food from each other and complicate reducing. Often one pet is overweight and another is just fine. In these situations, you can try to feed individual meals in separate areas. Put down the ration and remove it after a set period, perhaps 20 minutes.

Another problem is with cats. Cats often are fed free choice, with food available all of the time, which makes restriction difficult. Cats can be trained to eat individual rations as with dogs; measure the correct amount, feed in separate areas, and remove food after a set period.

Exercise will increase metabolism and use more calories. Start small and work up to at least 20 minutes daily. This amount of exercise is not expected to be all that is needed to bring weight down; reducing food intake is still essential. Dogs can be walked or played with. Cats might like to chase a laser pointer or various cat toys available in most stores. Exercising with our pets is good for us too!

Monitoring success or failure is as important as food reduction. Weigh your pet at intervals until the goal is met. A 1-2 % weekly weight reduction should be safe for most pets. Cats in particular need to lose weight slowly to avoid hepatic lipidosis. Continue to restrict the diet until a gradual weight loss is seen. All too often I will see a pet some time after the initial consultation and will find

that there has been weight gain instead of loss. Owners are frustrated and the pet is no better in spite of our efforts. This occurs because of several possible factors. There may be a failure in our plan for reduction. Another family member may be feeding additional food. The pet may be stealing food from another place. Reexamine all sources of food and correct if needed. The pet may still get too much food. It may be necessary to reduce the food even further. Owners are often surprised with how little food is actually needed. There may be a complicating disease such as hypothyroidism in dogs. Consider an evaluation by your veterinarian with a possible blood test.

Obesity is a frustrating problem. Try the simple suggestions listed here first. If you are still having difficulties achieving your goals, consult with your veterinarian for help. A recent study demonstrated a nearly 2 year increase in dog's longevity with appropriate weight management! That is the equivalent of almost 15 years for humans.

The holidays are coming! Remember to watch what ours pets get into in the busy months ahead. Chocolate, mistletoe (stem, leaves and berries), and Poinsettia (stem and leaves) should be avoided in dogs. Cats need to stay away from tinsel and wrapping materials. See your veterinarian for advice and treatment.

On September 29 there was an estate sale to benefit the animals. For this event we owe thanks to Cheryl Berg, a terrific real estate agent who loves animals. Over \$2,100 was raised during the sale.

On September 30, Susan Wallace hosted a really fun house tour of her rebuilt Nevada City home. My gosh, is it beautiful!! I'm sorry for

all those who were unable to make it, for it really was a wonderful time. This event brought in around \$5,000.

Doris Balog headed up a team to create and then mail out our letter of solicitation and so far Sammie's Friends has received around \$7,500 in responses from this effort. Doris and the team put a lot of work into this effort and we are very appreciative of the effort and the way it turned out.

Also, thanks to the writing skills of Barbara Graves, we recently received a \$10,000 grant from PetSmart Charities. This is the largest amount Sammie's Friend has ever received in grant funds and we are so very grateful to Barbara for all her hard work.

All of these efforts total \$32,100 in funds raised since August. Yeah!. Triple Yeah! This is an amazing achievement and one that everyone should be so very

proud of!!

There is never any shortage of animals needing help ranging from \$100+ for small injuries or illnesses to the "big ticket items" such as Cricket's injuries. Cricket's vet bill was about \$3,300 which, thankfully, Sammie's Friends was able to cover.

Fortunately we don't get too many bills over \$1,000 or we'd have to work even harder! It is a joy though to know of so many people who will work together for the betterment of the animals. I love it that so many people love the animals and put their hearts and souls and time and money into helping them.

How long a NCAS Volunteer: Karen has been a volunteer at NCAS for about a year.


Because he enjoys working on a computer, Bob also makes special fliers for hard to place dogs. He also prints out all the new listings for the new dogs at the shelter that are posted on

More than 110 motorcyclists found their way to Rough and Ready on September 8 to support the second annual Ride for Sammie's Friends.

Registration for the ride started at 9:30 AM. There were several motorcycle clubs that showed their support including the Marines, Christian Motorcycle Association, Harley Owners Groups and others. There were singles, couples and just bunches of friends riding together. They were treated to free Starbucks coffee and breakfast before getting the first card in their poker hand and riding out on their way to a possible high hand. The riders cruised down Highway 49, stopping first at the NCCFD fire station for their second card. They then turned on Lime Kiln Road riding past horse ranches and country homes to Penn Valley where they stopped at the Chevron for their third card. From Penn Valley, riders were able to catch a glimpse of the covered bridge while riding down Pleasant Valley Road to Highway 49. After riding along the river back to Nevada City and Grass Valley, participants stopped at Renegade Classics clothing store to get their fourth card before ending their ride at the Nevada County Horsemen's Club off Brunswick Road where they picked their fifth and final card.

Upon their arrival, the crowd enjoyed the music of Runnin' 4 Cover. Volunteers served a lunch of lasagna, salad, bread and a huge choice of desserts. Many of

the riders chose to sit out on one of two huge porches that lined the Horsemen's Club. Others just wanted to lie on the green grass under the shade trees and trade motorcycle stories. Raffle prizes included tool kits, hotel stays, Harley shirts, gift certificates, a new propane BBQ and too many more to mention. Autographed sports memorabilia was won at the silent auction with prizes going to the highest bidders. and donations (both private and corporate) close to \$5,000 was raised for Sammie's Friends to help provide medical care for the homeless dogs and cats of Nevada County.


A silent auction was held that was lots of fun and helped raised money for the animals. Thanks to the many people who donated and sponsored the

Estate Sale to Benefit Sammie's Friends

PetSmart Awards Sammie's Friends \$10,000

In August, Sammie's Friends received \$10,000 from PetSmart Charities. This is the largest amount of money we've received from any grant so far written by Team Sammie Grant Writer, Barbara Graves.

Barbara wrote the "Preliminary Proposal" in October, 2006. Sammie's Friends received no money at that time, because PetSmart had expended all of their funds for the year 2006.

In January 2007 Sammie's Friends received from PetSmart, an "invitation" to apply for their available 2007 grant funds.

PetSmart indicated that they do not ordinarily fund "on-going expenses" but the grant committee was so impressed with the work that Sammie's Friends has been doing that they wanted to give us money anyway!!

Barbara went ahead and filled out the 2007 application in the early months of this year. Then she and all the Team Sammie volunteers who knew of the application sat down and began to wait. And wait. And wait some more.....

After several months of waiting, worrying and wondering, at the beginning of August, PetSmart awarded \$10,000 to Sammie's

Friends, and mailed Sammie's Friends co-founder, Cheryl Wicks, a check for the full amount!

The money received from this grant award will be used for treating heartworm-positive animals. Barbara says that the process of writing the proposal and the grant probably took about 20 hours and asks, "Not too shabby in terms of an hourly rate, is it??"
